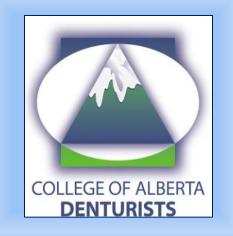

History

The denturist profession is a young profession, with the first legislation in 1961, and this was in Alberta. We were pleased to have celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the profession in 2011.

The denturist profession in Canada has approximately 2,000 licensed denturists. In Alberta at the end of 2013, we had 287 Regulated Members on the register; we have the third largest number of denturists, with Quebec having the largest and Ontario being second.

The College of Alberta Denturists is the Regulatory Body for the Profession of Denturists in Alberta pursuant to the Alberta *Health Professions Act* and the **Denturists Profession Regulation** enacted thereunder. Schedule 8 of the *Health Professions Act* was proclaimed in force as was the **Denturists Profession Regulation** on September 01, 2002.

Prior to this proclamation, the profession in Alberta was governed under the *Dental Mechanics Act* and regulated by the Board of Examiners for Certified Dental Mechanics; this administered by the Alberta Government.

Denturists are independent primary healthcare providers who provide dental prostheses for patients who are missing one or more of their natural teeth, as well as some other dental related services which are not restricted activities; such as sports mouthguards and tooth whitening procedures.

Most denturists provide their services from independent "denture clinics"; however, some provide services from dental offices, in health institutions, and private residences. In their practice, denturists do one or more of the following:

- > Assess, diagnose and treat persons missing some or all of their natural teeth;
- Design, construct, repair, alter and fit any complete or partial denture for the purpose of restoring and maintaining function and appearance,
- > Teach, manage and conduct research in the science, techniques and practice of denturism, and
- Provide restricted activities authorized in the regulation as follows:

Restricted activities authorization

- **14** Regulated members may, in the practice of denturism and in accordance with the standards of practice, perform the following restricted activities:
 - 1) prescribe or fit
- (i) a removable partial or complete denture, or
- (ii) a fixed or removable implant supported prosthesis that replaces 2 or more teeth;
- 2) perform an invasive procedure on body tissue below the mucous membrane or in or below the surface of teeth if the procedure does not alter natural dentition;
- 3) insert and remove instruments, devices and fingers into an artificial opening of the mouth;
- 4) reduce a dislocation of a temporomandibular joint for the purposes of reducing a subluxation of the temporomandibular joint;
- 5) order any form of ionizing radiation in medical radiography.

In some situations, denturists may work in conjunction with other healthcare practitioners such as general dentists, dental specialists, dental hygienists, dental assistants, dental technologists, physicians and surgeons, to provide comprehensive health services to their patients.

Denturists in Canada receive training at one of four institutions. In 2015, three of these institutions have programs that are accredited:

- > NAIT Edmonton, Alberta
- > Vancouver Community College Vancouver, British Columbia

- **George Brown College** Toronto, Ontario
- > The following is the unaccredited program of study:
- Collège Édouard-Montpetit Longueuil, Quebec

In Alberta, the NAIT denturist program is currently a three-year program of studies. Upon graduation, the graduates must then successfully challenge the College of Alberta Denturists regulatory examinations as part of the requirements for registration as a Regulated Member, and to subsequently be issued with a practice permit which allows them to practice independently. An individual who is in transition between graduation and his/her successful completion of the examinations must register as a Provisional Regulated Member" and may provide denturist's services if he/she is in a College-approved employment agreement with a supervising Regulated Member of the College.

In Alberta, denturists use the titles of "denturist", "registered denturist", and "denture specialist". In Canada, the initials "DD" identify a Regulated Member, and some Regulated Members are also appointed as Fellows of the Canadian Academy of Denturism, identified by the initials "F.C.A.D.".

By letter dated February 5, 2002, the Minister of Health granted approval pursuant to Section 27 of the *Health Professions Act* for the College to provide guidelines for professional fees in the form of a recommended fee schedule, and to negotiate professional fees on behalf of its Regulated Members via a committee made up of members elected by the general membership, functioning independently of the Council and reporting to Council only for purposes of providing information. Those activities are the responsibility of the Fee Guide Development & Negotiation Committee.

Continuing Competence in the Profession

10.1(1) A regulated member registered on the general register must complete 100 hours of continuing education, in accordance with the rules established by the Council under section 11, in each sequential 5-year period beginning on the January 1 following the year of the regulated member's initial registration under the Dental Mechanics Regulation (AR 315/69) or under this Regulation.

(2) To obtain continuing education credit hours, a regulated member registered on the general register may undertake one or more of the following continuing education activities if those activities contain scientific or clinical content related to the practice of denturism:

- (a) a program of full time study;
- (b) attendance at or participation in conventions or conferences;
- (c) self-study or distance education courses;
- (d) preparation of publications;
- (e) any other activities approved by the Council, Registrar or Registration Committee.
- (3) To obtain continuing education credit hours, a regulated member may undertake continuing education activities that promote the personal or non-clinical development of the regulated member to a maximum of 10 hours in the 5 years preceding the date of renewal of practice permit.
- (4) A regulated member must submit to the Registrar the hours of continuing education that the member has undertaken and specify the activities undertaken in accordance with the rules established under section 11.
- (5) A one credit hour is given for every hour of participation in a continuing education activity unless otherwise specified in the rules established under section 11.

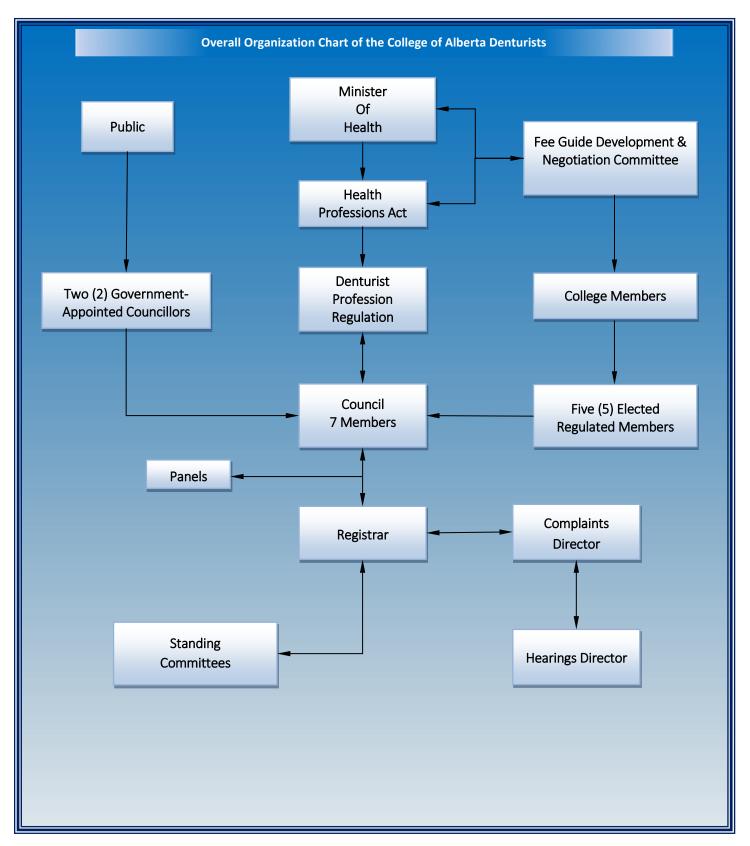
The aforementioned "section 11" refers to the Continuing Competency Rules established by the College Council. In the absence of a Competence Committee, the College of Alberta Denturists Registration Committee is responsible for the duties of "a competence committee"; this allowable pursuant to Section 10(3) of the *Health Professions Act*.

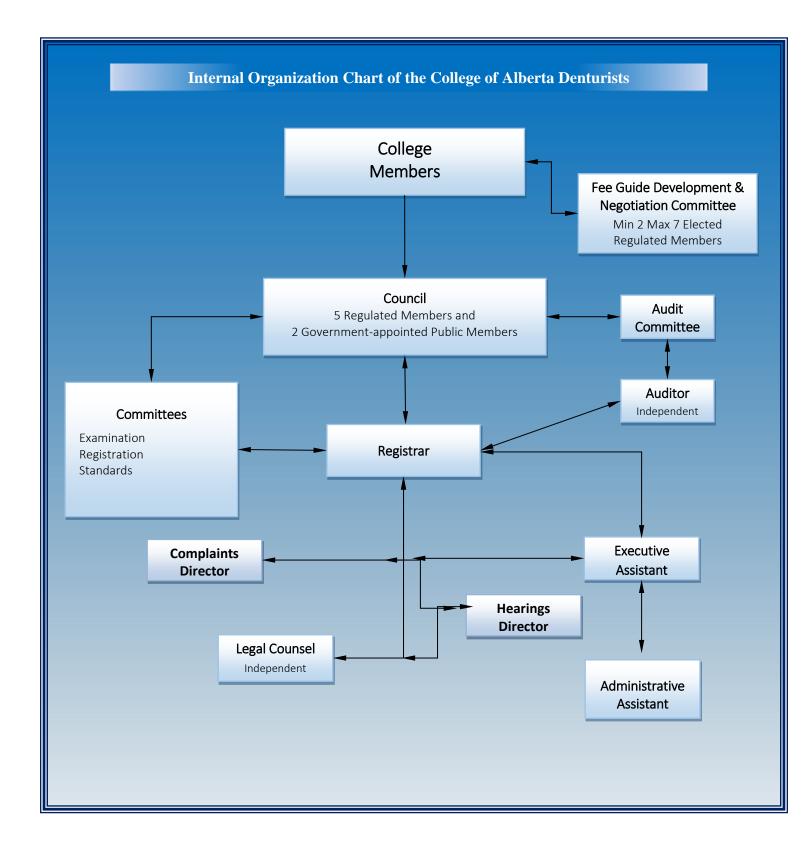
College Council has not appointed inspectors pursuant to Part 3.1 of the *Health Professions Act*, and inspections are not currently being carried out. Similarly, the College does not (as yet) conduct practice visits as provided for in s.51. of the *Health Professions Act*, and therefore does not have a separate Competence Committee.

The College's Registrar is responsible for monitoring a regulated member's compliance with the requirements of continuing competence.

President of Council – Annual Report

On behalf of the Council of the College of Alberta Denturists, I am pleased to present the President's report for 2015. The Council for 2015-2016 is composed of two government-appointed Public Members, Kevin Peddie and Aaron Zelmer (both from Edmonton), and five Regulated Members including myself as President (St. Albert): John Burnham, Vice President (Edmonton); Cara-Lee Voss-Seiler (Grande Prairie); Rae-Lynne Robichaud (Grande Prairie); and Dave Bennett (Edmonton). Council welcomed newly-elected Dave Bennett, and acknowledged with appreciation the contribution of our departing President Jennifer Auld.

Council members are elected at the College's Annual General Meeting for a two-year term. In 2015, Council met in person six times, and additionally, has addressed items as needed, via email and teleconference.

2015 saw several changes in staffing with first the introduction of Pauline Farmer and then Carol Humphries as Complaint Director's, with Peter Portlock the Registrar acting as interim Complaints Director for several months. Then in October 2015, Carol Stewart joined CAD as the new Registrar and Peter Portlock (temporary CAD Advisor) officially departed on December 15, 2015.

More specifically:

- Council supported continued work on the pre Objectively Structured Clinic Examination (OSCE) format for the College's Denturist Qualifying Examinations for licensure, to commence in 2016.
- Council enjoyed the annual education conference, that the Denturist Association of Alberta with the Denturists Association of Canada's Annual Meeting.
- The College advanced discussions with Alberta government ministries to relinquish the authority granted to the College by the Minister of Health in 2002 under section 27 of the Health Professions Act, in favor of the DAA. This is in relation "to setting professional fees, providing guidelines on professional fees, and negotiating professional fees on behalf of regulated members". COUNCIL was advised that this would NOT be a consideration of the government and must remain with CAD.
- With the arrival of Carol Stewart in October the Council has seen some changes in much of the accounting and business organization.
- Council in 2016 will be streamlining as much of the operation of CAD as possible.

I would like to express my personal appreciation to each of the many Regulated Members who have volunteered to serve on College Committees and Council, facilitating the successful operation of the profession's regulatory body in Alberta over the past year. Council must single out the Exam Committee and all those who assisted in the preparation of the new exam format. Council also acknowledges the efforts of our excellent staff in supporting the College's operations in 2015.

The College staff and the individual members of the council demonstrate a commitment to the principles of public confidence and the integrity of the general membership, along with the delivery of reliable and safe denturist services. Audit Committee Report

The Audit Committee is a Committee composed of two Council Members of the College. Our duty is to liaise with the Auditor, the College Administration, and the Council, for the processes required to produce the Audited Financial Statements for consideration of approval by the Council.

In 2015 the College remained with BDO Canada LLP as the Auditor; this as appointed by the Council subsequent to the directive from our Regulated Members at our 2014 Annual General Meeting. This year the lead BDO auditor for the College was Mr. John Anderlic and Brian Heerensperger, both partners with the firm.

The Audit Committee had a meeting with the Auditors on June 10, 2016 to review the draft financial statements for 2015, and to review the results of the audit

There were no audit items of concern raised by the auditor and the audited financial statements were subsequently presented to the Council for review and approval prior to providing them for inclusion to the Government in the College's Annual Report and prior to reporting to the Regulated Members at our upcoming 2015 Annual General Meeting.

It is the recommendation of our Registrar/Administrator to change auditors to Gallo & Company a smaller firm out of Sherwood Park who has provided a three-year quote of: 2016 - \$8 to \$10 thousand; 2017 -the same and 2018 - a 5% increase. This is down significantly from the \$18,000 for this year.

We will be making that motion at the AGM.

Examination Committee Report

The Examination Committee is composed of appointed Regulated Members, Mr. Michael Weiss as the appointed Chairperson, Mr. Tony Ivicevic, Mr. Kevin Cho, Mr. Chris Duncan, Mr. Dan Mihajlov, Mr. Darren Strach, Ms. Shelley Schlesiger, and Ms. Erin Maksymytz.

Previously, in order to be eligible for registration as a Regulated Member of the College, a candidate must have successfully challenged a three-part Denturists Qualifying Examination (DQE):

DQE – I (theory/written) DQE – II (practical/removable partial dentures) DQE – III (practical/clinical)

The College offered one "sittings of the examination" in December 2015 with the following results:

5 (of 7) were successful

Currently, in order to be eligible for registration as a Regulated Member of the College, a candidate must be successful in two separate but related exams:

The MCQ (Multiple Choice Question), which is a Theory Exam of 200 questions; The OSCE (Objective Structured Clinical Examination), which is a Practical Exam rooted in simulation. It consists of 16-18 stations over two days.

The College offered one "sittings of examinations" in June 2016 with the following results:

MCQ 15 (of 17) were successful OSCE 15 (of 18) were successful

The cumulative result of those who challenged the 2016 licensing exam process is:

14 (of 18) were successful

On April 29, 2011 (revisited and reaffirmed in July of 2014), Council tasked the Exam Committee to develop a current and accepted Exam Process that is defendable, fair and accurate in assessing competency. The new licensing examinations were held on June 17, 18 & 19 of 2016 at the University of Alberta, and replaced the old DQE I, II & III (Denturist Qualifying Examinations). The College is very proud of the dedication of its Exam Committee Members and the advancement of assessment in this direction.

Fee Guide Development & Negotiations Committee Report

The Fee Guide and Negotiation Committee is responsible for the negotiation of fees with various organizations and for the development of a recommended fee schedule for the Denturist profession in Alberta. This committee is allowable per the Minister of Health's approval pursuant to **Section 27** of the **Health Professions Act.** The committee works at "arm's length" from the College and is composed of three Regulated Members who are in good standing. These members are elected yearly at the Annual General Meeting. In 2014, the committee was composed of Steve Sailer, Joanna Cho, and myself as Chair.

In September, all the members of the committee met to establish fee changes for the 2015 Recommended Fee Schedule. At this meeting we decided to increase fees between 3% and 4% with some higher increases on a handful of procedures we deemed were undervalued. The Recommended Fee Schedule is distributed to all regulated members in Alberta as well

as all Insurance Providers that request it. We aim to have the Recommended Fee Schedule distributed by the end of December or early January of every year.

We continue to keep in contact with Regulated Members about how Government Dental programs are being administered. In 2014, the Dental Assistance for Seniors Program saw no significant changes. Fees have remained the same as 2013 and Alberta Blue Cross continues to administer the claims process. The only notable change is that the DASP was moved within Government of Alberta ministries. The Seniors and Community Supports portfolio has been changed to Seniors and with that change then DASP was moved under the umbrella of Alberta Health.

The contract with Alberta Human Services is scheduled to continue until June 30, 2017. The contract is administered by the Alberta Dental Service Corporation. We are scheduled to see a couple smaller increases in these fees. The increases are set to take effect every July 1 and follow the National Consumer Price Index as published by Statistics Canada.

The Non Insured Health Benefits (NIHB) program is a nationally administered and negotiated program. The Denturist Association of Canada is primarily responsible for negotiations with the Federal Government regarding this program. Claims are administered by Express Scripts nationally. The committee receives regular complaints from Regulated Members about the administration and fees paid by the NIHB program. We continue to be in contact with both Express Scripts and NIHB administrators about concerns brought forward by members. However, we are limited by the national nature of this program and have little influence on its operation.

The Denturist Association of Alberta (DAA) and the College of Alberta Denturists (CAD) continue to have discussions around transferring this committee from CAD to DAA. No timeline or deadline for this transfer has been set but talks continue.

Registration Committee Report

The Registration Committee has worked with the Registrar in 2015 to welcome several new people to the industry while ensuring that additional requirements were put in place to assure that a high level of competency is maintained by the denturist.

Both the provincial and federal government through the Domestic and International Labour Mobility Unit of the provincial government are pushing to accept denturists from other areas without any additional requirements. This is something that the College through this committee and the standards will continue to address. Though practitioners moving to Alberta has certainly slowed down in late 2015 and 2016 due to Alberta's drop in economy.

Standards Committee Report

The Standards Committee reviewed the Standard's of Practice in 2015 and then sent them to the necessary partners for comment. In August 2015, the committee joined the Registrar, Peter Portlock on a conference call to discuss the government of Alberta's response to the proposed Standard's of Practice.

Mr. Portlock had misplaced the files, finding them in August 2016 the new Registrar will review the information and hopefully bring forward the final draft in the fall of 2016.

Order of Merit

This award is presented by the College as a way of recognizing past or present Alberta Denturists, for their outstanding contribution to our profession. The first "Order of Merit" was presented in 2001 at Banff, in conjunction with the celebration of the 40th Anniversary of the Denturist Profession in Alberta.

In Alberta, there is a significant number of practitioners who have gone beyond the norm of just practicing our profession. Educators, mentors, lecturers, and leaders: those who have given up time from their practices and families to advance and assist the profession. As well there are a great number of Members of this small profession, who have historically donated their time through volunteering to be on the Executive of the Alberta Denturist Society and the Board of Examiners for Certified Dental Mechanics.

Although these people are doing this work without seeking special recognition for their efforts, the College of Alberta Denturists feels it is appropriate for us to show our appreciation for their hard work, with the presentation of this prestigious Annual Award. Members at large are invited to submit a Nomination Form to the College of Alberta Denturists office, for an individual they believe is deserving of this honor. The Council reviews all nominations and subsequently votes on a recipient.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of OperationsThe College of Alberta Denturists (the "College") was
established under the Health Professions Act to regulate the
profession of denturism in Alberta and to strive to ensure that
Albertans receive ethical, professional and safe denturist
services. The College is registered as a not-for-profit
organization and, as such, is exempt from income taxes.

- Basis of Accounting These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO) using the restricted fund method of recording contributions. The following policies have been adopted by the College.
- Fund Accounting In order to ensure observance of the limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Accordingly, resources are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds. These funds are held in accordance with the directives of the Executive Council and the College's internal policies. For financial reporting purposes, the accounts have been classified into the following funds:

Unrestricted General Fund

This fund is available for general purposes and reflects the transactions associated with the operating activities of the College.

Invested in Capital Assets

This fund records the activities associated with the College's capital assets.

Restricted Professional Conduct Fund

The College is required to maintain an ability to discharge the financial requirements that result from it's statutory obligations as contained in the Health Professions Act and in the Denturists Profession Regulation enacted thereunder. The externally restricted Professional Conduct Fund (PCF) reflects the above financial obligations. The College Council may at it's discretion allocate funds from the General Fund to supplement shortfalls in the PCF.

- 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)
 - Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates and may have an impact on future periods.

Significant areas requiring the use of estimates include the determination of the useful life of capital assets and allowance for doubtful accounts.

- Financial Instruments Financial Instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. In subsequent periods, equities traded in an active market and derivatives are reported at fair value, with any unrealized gains and losses reported in operations. All other financial instruments are reported at cost or amortized cost less impairment, if applicable. Financial assets are tested for impairment when changes in circumstances indicate the asset could be impaired. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale or issue of financial instruments are expensed for those items remeasured at fair value at each period end date and charged to the financial instrument for those measured at amortized cost.
- Leases Leases are classified as capital or operating leases. A lease that transfers substantially all of the benefits and risks incidental to the ownership of property is classified as a capital lease. At the inception of a capital lease, an asset and an obligation are recorded at an amount equal to the lesser of the present value at the beginning of the lease. All other leases are accounted for as operating leases; wherein, rental payments are expensed as incurred.

During the year, the College entered into an agreement for consulting and logistics support services. The estimated cost of the services is \$40,000. At December 31, 2015, an estimated \$33,000 remains to be paid with respect to this commitment.

9. Professional Conduct Fund

The PCF was initially funded through a \$500 fee per Regulated Member. This fund is externally restricted by the College's Regulated Members to fund professional conduct costs incurred by the College.

The PCF Policy sets a desired minimum amount for the fund, based on the number of Regulated Members multiplied by the amount of the PCF fee and the retained PCF fees of former Regulated Members who have resigned for a period not exceeding two years. Council may require all Regulated Members to pay a special levy in an amount necessary to restore the PCF account to the minimum amount, if necessary.

12. Malpractice Insurance Fees

The College collects Malpractice Insurance fees from members which are paid to the insurance carrier on their behalf. The amount collected and paid in 2015 was \$45,240 (2014 - \$43,790). The amounts collected from the members and payments on the member's behalf, relating to insurance, have not been reflected in the financial statements as revenue or expenses.

13. Financial Instrument Risk

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The College is exposed to credit risk resulting from the possibility that a member or counterparty to a financial instrument defaults on their financial obligations; if there is a concentration of transactions carried out with the same counterparty; or of financial obligations which have similar economic characteristics such that they could be similarly affected by changes in economic conditions. The College's primary exposure to credit risk relates to accounts receivable from members for disciplinary action.

14. Comparative Figures

The financial statements have been reclassified, where applicable, to conform to the presentation used in the current year. The changes do not affect prior year excess (deficiency) of revenue over expenses.
